### **Pacific Crest Trail Hike**

All Long Term Backpackers,

This memorial day we are continuing our PCT (Pacific Crest Trail) backpacking experience. This year the scouts want to step it up a little: 50 miles in 3 1/2 days. We'll hike a few on Friday night and a little over 15 on each of Sat, Sun, Monday. We'll start on the Angeles Forest Highway about 10 miles south of Hwy 14. The trail goes west, then north across Hwy 14 thru Vasquez Rocks, Agua Dulce to Francisquito Canyon. We'll tailor the exact mileage per day as we go and are able to go as far as the scouts want. This trip is designed for backpackers with multiple Long Term experience who want the maximum mileage possible in a weekend. This trip is longer than many "week long treks" done in half the time.

I am looking for both scouts and adults who want to set the distance record for a Troop 849 backpack.

## **Laws Camp Hike**

Laws Camp is a beautiful setting in the San Jacinto Wilderness Area east of Idyllwild. We plan to leave Manhattan Beach at 5 AM and drive to the Humber Park trailhead in Idyllwild. The most difficult part of the hike is the first 2 ½ miles where the elevation gain is about 1,700 feet. On Saturday, we plan to visit the fire lookout on Tahquitz peak before hiking to the campsite. On Sunday, we should be home in the afternoon.

This moderate hike is for scouts and adults with some backpacking experience with the Troop. It is an excellent hike for scouts in their second summer with the Troop. Since the group size limit on our permit is 12, we may have to prioritize who will be on the hike if we have more than 12 people sign up. First priority will be to the Philmont group scouts and adults, second priority will be to scouts, and third priority will be to adults beyond the Troop's three deep requirement.
